
And then something happened that I'll never forget.

MCC SEES 12.2 PERCENT

ENROLLMENT GROWTH FOR SPRING SEMESTER 2025




Meridian Community College continues its strong enrollment growth, with a 12.2 percent increase in student headcount and an 8.8 percent rise in student credit hours for spring semester 2025 compared to last spring, according to official 10th-day enrollment numbers provided by the Mississippi Community College Board.



These gains place MCC among Mississippi's top three community colleges for enrollment growth.

The latest statistics demonstrate MCC's growth is outpacing the state average, which stands at 6.4 percent for headcount and 5.8 percent for credit hours.

MCC President Dr. Tom Huebner noted that the upward count is encouraging. "Our fall enrollment increase was a record, and this percentage growth is even higher. We still have room to grow, but I'm pleased with our momentum."

More than 120 years of Meridian Coca-Cola Bottling Company's history are depicted in brightly colored murals painted on the walls of its old bottling room, a reflection of the company's successful legacy as a centennial family business.

"Our success is based on our involvement with the community," said Hardy Graham Jr., who currently serves as president and chairman of Meridian Coca-Cola Bottling Company. "We try to do everything we can to support our community and be involved as much as we can, and I think doing that makes us a beverage that people think of first. We show our loyalty to the community, and the community has shown their loyalty to us and our products."

"Starting with dad, we've always felt a really strong connection to Meridian Community College, and we felt it was really important for us, personally and companywide, to support MCC because the more education we can provide the community the more our community is going to thrive," Graham said. "We can attract more businesses to the community if we've got a good education system, which will result in people getting higher paying jobs."

Meridian Coca-Cola Bottling Company is passionate about its investment in the community and the people it serves. Meridian Community College and the MCC Foundation are two institutions that have greatly benefitted from the company's strong leadership and sense of civic pride.

Besides sponsorships and support for the Foundation's Tuition Guarantee Program, Meridian Coca-Cola Bottling's leadership has always looked with overwhelming optimism toward the College's future. Graham currently serves on the MCC Foundation Board of Directors, a seat his father, the late Hardy Graham Sr., held for many years, which included serving as a past president. Hardy Graham Sr. was a longtime advocate for MCC and worked diligently to ensure the College's success. The College's Graham Gymnasium is named in his honor.

"The best thing for our area is for Meridian Community College to be as strong as it can be and to do as well as it can, and we at Meridian Coca-Cola Bottling are trying to do our part to make sure that happens," Graham added.

Meridian Coca-Cola Bottling Company was founded in 1902 as the first franchised bottler of Coca-Cola in the state of Mississippi, established as part of the Louisiana Company out of New Orleans. Unfortunately, the company fell into bankruptcy within its first two years.



Graham's great grandfather, Richard Newell Poindexter, who had entered the Coca-Cola bottling business in the Carolinas in 1902 on an offer from his cousin J.T. Lupton, moved to the Deep South and purchased Meridian Coca-Cola Bottling in 1904.

At that time, Meridian's population was booming on the back of the railroad lines, and the city offered promise for emerging businesses. Meridian Coca-Cola Bottling was no exception as the iconic soft drink became popular in the community.

Following Poindexter, Graham's great uncle, Zed Hawkins, ran Meridian Coca-Cola Bottling until his death in 1972. Hardy Graham Sr. returned to Meridian in 1970 to work at the Meridian bottler and took over as president in 1979. The fourth generation to helm the company, Hardy Graham Jr., returned to Meridian and the company in 1997 after spending five years working for Memphis Coca-Cola and Jackson Coca-Cola. He assumed the role of president in 2016.

A fifth generation of the family has also stepped into roles within the realm of independently owned U.S. Coca-Cola bottlers. His daughter Lilli Graham works for Coca-Cola in Jackson, Mississippi, and a nephew, Liam Morphis, works for Coca-Cola in Jackson, Tennessee.

Employing more than 90, Meridian Coca-Cola Bottling Company supplies some of the most popular brands of soft drinks, waters, teas, and beverages throughout east central Mississippi and west central Alabama. Some of these iconic brands include Coca-Cola, Diet Coke, Sprite, Dasani, Vitamin Water, Gold Peak Tea, Powerade, and Mello Yello. Between 300 and 350 flavors of products are distributed into all or parts of 17 counties from Macon in the north to Buckatunna and Sandersville in the south and from Forest to Eutaw, Alabama.

Graham said Meridian Coca-Cola Bottling is committed to its future and is working to ensure the surrounding community thrives. Through donations and volunteerism to schools and athletic programs, museums, festivals, nonprofit organizations, pageants, and community events, he believes Meridian Coca-Cola will continue to have a positive impact on the Meridian community.

"We have had a tremendous impact on the community going back to the very beginning. We've always had the philosophy of giving back to the community that has helped our business do so well," Graham said. "It has been our goal to be a good steward to our community and our surrounding area."


Candy Cruise

THE POWER OF HOME

MCC UNVEILS CITIZENS NATIONAL BANK SPORTS COMPLEX, CREATING HOME FOR SOFTBALL, TENNIS

For years, Meridian Community College's softball and tennis teams represented the College with pride while navigating challenges that few outside the programs fully understood.

Softball was played wherever space was available. Tennis players practiced on aging courts and had to travel to compete. Hosting a home match? Not possible. Feeling truly connected to campus? Out of reach.

That all began to change in Spring 2025 with the grand opening of the Citizens National Bank Sports Complex – a stunning, purposebuilt facility located just across the street from MCC's main campus on Mississippi Highway 19 North.

Softball was the first to take the field, officially calling the new stadium home. The tennis program will follow soon, as its brandnew courts near completion. Together, these teams – and the students, coaches, and fans behind them – now have a place that reflects their commitment and potential.

"If we're going to field teams, then we owe it to our student-athletes to give them the environment they deserve to grow, compete, and thrive," said MCC President Dr. Tom Huebner. "This complex shows we're serious about doing just that."





A VISION WITH PURPOSE

The idea for the complex started with a problem and a question.

Shortly after arriving at MCC in 2018, Dr. Huebner learned the tennis program, one of the most historically successful in the country, could no longer host matches due to insufficient and deteriorating courts. Softball, meanwhile, had no field of its own. Both programs were disconnected from the campus experience.

"We had incredible athletes and dedicated coaches, but no home," said MCC Athletic Director Sander Atkinson. "It was time to change that." Dr. Huebner spent months scouting locations, trying to find enough space on MCC's landlocked campus to make something work. Nothing seemed to fit until Dr. Leia Hill, vice president for institutional advancement and executive director of the MCC Foundation, suggested the former Matty Hersee Hospital site near the College.

"At first, I thought she was joking," Huebner admitted. "There was a steep slope, and I didn't think it could be done. But when our facilities director measured it out, we realized it was possible – and maybe even perfect."

BUILT FOR THE FUTURE

The new complex delivers on every level.

The softball stadium, named after longtime MCC administrator Dr. Tommy McDonald, features a fully turfed field, a state-of-the-art field lighting system, an indoor hitting facility, and a modern press box with bleachers. The team played its first season there in Spring 2025 and immediately felt the difference.

"It's hard to explain how meaningful it is to finally have a place of our own," said Head Softball Coach Brad Grinstead. "Our players walk into this facility and feel pride. They feel like they matter – because they do."

Nearby, the eight-court tennis complex – named for MCC coaching legend Wanda McPhail – is nearing

completion. Though not ready for the 2025 season, it's already turning heads.

"When our players see this facility, their eyes light up," said former Head Tennis Coach Ryan Mounce. "It's not just a place to compete – it's a symbol of what our program stands for and where it's going."

Both programs are housed in a renovated fieldhouse that also supports MCC's golf team, offering updated locker rooms, team meeting space, and amenities that elevate the daily student-athlete experience.

"We're no longer just making do," said Atkinson. "Now, we're making a statement."



POWERED BY COMMUNITY

The complex is named for Citizens National Bank, a hometown institution with a long history of supporting MCC and the region.



"When we started looking for a partner, Citizens National Bank was the obvious choice," said Dr. Huebner. "They're deeply invested in our community, and they believe in the power of local."

That belief is already producing results. MCC has welcomed local high school teams, special events, and Challenger Baseball games to the new facility. And, there there's more to come. With tennis soon able to host matches and tournaments, MCC will become a destination for regional events.

"We're seeing more visitors, more families, and more opportunities," Dr. Huebner said. "And that means more visibility for our college and more support for our students."



MORE THAN A FACILITY

For MCC, the complex isn't just about bricks and turf. It's about belonging, momentum, and the message it sends to every student on campus – from athletes to artists, future nurses to future welders.

"When our student-athletes walk into this space, they know they're valued," said Grinstead. "That impacts how they train, how they compete, and how they carry themselves."

For Mounce, it's also about legacy.

"Coach Wanda McPhail (long-time MCC tennis coach) built a tradition of excellence," he said. "Now we have a facility that lives up to that tradition and helps us take the next step."

And for Dr. Huebner, it's a matter of mission.

"Our job is to create the best possible environment for our students," he said. "This complex helps us do that – and then some."

As softball continues to settle into its new home and tennis prepares to serve its first match, the Citizens National Bank Sports Complex stands as more than a venue. It's a symbol of investment, progress, and the promise of what's ahead.

And that's the true power of home.





MCC CELEBRATES COMMUNITY, LEGACY AT HALL OF FAME

When James Carter bought a green jacket years ago, he told a coworker he planned to wear it someday on the McCain Theater stage—for his Hall of Fame induction. This year, that moment came true.

Meridian Community College honored four individuals during its annual Hall of Fame ceremony, recognizing their impact on the College and the community. The event, held in McCain Theater, was hosted by the MCC Foundation.

The 2025 Hall of Fame class included James Carter, Wanda Dixon (posthumously), Marmion Loving Francis, and Alice James.

Dixon, remembered by her husband Richard "Dick" Dixon, was the longtime chair of math and science at MCC. 

ALUM DREW MOFFETT FROM EAGLES SECOND BASEMAN TO INDEPENDENT PHARMACY OWNER



From patience and dedication to hard work and determination, Meridian Community College alumnus Drew Moffett is discovering traits he learned playing baseball at the College nearly two decades ago are proving beneficial as a successful independent retail pharmacy owner.

Moffett returned to Meridian following pharmacy school in 2013 to work as a staff pharmacist at Ole Town Family Pharmacy, a fixture on 24th Avenue near downtown Meridian for decades.

"I actually went into pharmacy school with the intention of owning this pharmacy. That was my goal from day one," he said. "I felt like if you're going to open a business, especially a small business where people typically tend to use people that they know, then Meridian was my best option in terms of ownership. I am from the edge of Clarke County originally. My family has property there. I have ties to Meridian, and I didn't really care to live anywhere else."

In 2022, he and his wife, Neely, a native of Vicksburg, purchased the independent pharmacy and opened a second location on Lindley Road in Marion in 2024. Earlier this year, the couple was joined by their children, Bo, 9, and Molly, who will turn 8 this summer, as they celebrated a ribbon-cutting at Ole Town Family Pharmacy's new location. Between the two locations, the pharmacy employs 12, including two full-time and two part-time pharmacists.

Moffett said he felt the timing was right to open the new Marion location with the closings of other nearby pharmacies in recent years. "I really felt like there was a void in that part of the county for pharmacy coverage, and I felt that if there ever was a time to expand, then this was going to be the time," he said, adding, "I believe someone else would have done it if I didn't."

After graduating from Lamar School in 2004, Moffett signed to play baseball for the MCC Eagles. He was also a recipient of the MCC Foundation's Tuition Guarantee.

"Probably the biggest driving force for me to go to MCC was to play baseball," Moffett said. "I 'rode the pine' my freshman year behind a lot of good players, paid my dues, and then started at second base my sophomore year."

Bolstered by a promising roster of players, the Eagles captured the Mississippi Association of Community Colleges Conference (then known as the Mississippi Association of Community and Junior Colleges) State Championship in both 2005 and 2006.

"We went undefeated through state play, but then we lost the first two games in the regionals both years," he recalled. "We had a good team."

Moffett noted that MCC's current head baseball coach, Dillon Sudduth, was a second baseman for the Eagles the year before him.

"I keep in touch with him, and I still support and go watch MCC and their baseball games," he said.

Even though he was a local resident, Moffett lived on campus in the dorms along with other members of the baseball



team. He remembers his time with the baseball program fondly and is proud to say he earned his wings at Meridian Community College.

"I enjoyed my time very much at MCC," he said.

When Moffett graduated from

University of Mississippi, where he earned a bachelor of arts in biology in 2009, a bachelor of science in pharmaceutical sciences in 2011, and doctorate of pharmacy from the university's School of Pharmacy in 2013.

> "I went from MCC to Ole Miss and definitely didn't feel I was behind, by any means. All of my classes lined up, and I wasn't behind in any of my prerequisite classes," Moffett Miss where I left off at MCC."

He feels MCC more than prepared him for transfer to the

"It's truly wonderful to see this room filled with people who care deeply about MCC and our students," Hill said. "What we're building together is bigger than any one of us."




During the event, donors received reports about the funds they support and were encouraged to contact the Foundation with questions.

Hill reminded everyone that their gifts go beyond the classroom.

"You aren't just donors-you're family," she said. "And what you do is making a difference that lasts far beyond today."

Students also shared their stories - some through videos - showing how scholarships helped them stay in school, reach their goals, and find their wings.





College life can feel too much, too loud, too bright.

Meridian Community College students now have a place to step away from the intensity, thanks to the new Srivastava Family Sensory Room that offers a quiet space for anyone needing a break from sensory overload, including those with invisible disabilities.

Located in Room 140 of the L.O. Todd/Billy C. Beal Student Success Center, the room is a space for students, faculty, staff, and visitors who may need a break from overwhelming sights and sounds. It features dim lighting, soft seating, tactile tools, calming sounds, and visuals. One highlight is a tactile piece of art in the shape of MCC's Eagle head that visitors can touch and explore.

The room is named for the Srivastava family, who donated funds to make the space possible. It was created in partnership with KultureCity, a national nonprofit that supports individuals with invisible disabilities such as PTSD, autism, dementia, and Down syndrome.

MCC is the first community college in Mississippi to be certified by KultureCity. Over half of the College's faculty and staff have completed training in neurodiversity. The room took about a year to plan, build, and certify.



"This space helps people feel welcome without needing to explain their disability," said Jeanette Howell, director of advising at MCC. "It tells our students and our community, 'You belong here.""

The idea for the sensory room at MCC came together through chance meetings and shared ideas. Howell first learned about sensory rooms while visiting another college. Later, MCCers Jessi Beckman and the late Kelly McKee presented the idea while prepping for a discussion on neurodiversity.





Beckman reached out to KultureCity Executive Director Uma Srivastava. That connection led to the donation and official partnership.

Beckman said the room is important because invisible disabilities often go unnoticed or unsupported. "This room offers comfort and support without barriers," she said.

Howell noted, "It provides an accommodation for individuals - students, faculty, staff and visitors - without them having to disclose their disability to someone on campus. They can simply come over and utilize the room."

The Srivastava Family Sensory Room is now open during Advising Center hours: Monday through Thursday, 8 a.m. to 4:30 p.m., and Friday, 8 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Anyone on campus who needs a quiet, calming space is welcome to use it.





CARLTON "CORKY" PALMER MR. BASEBALL



With an overall career coaching record in high school, community college, and Division 1 college of 946-493, Carlton "Corky" Palmer was a powerhouse on and off the baseball diamond.

He died in August 2022 after a prolonged illness. He was 68.

Palmer grew up in Hattiesburg, graduating from Hattiesburg High School in 1972. From there, he graduated from the University of Southern Mississippi with a degree in coaching and athletic administration, playing baseball and serving as co-captain his senior year. He later earned his master of science degree in education from William Carey University.

During Palmer's coaching career, he served as head coach for two high schools before he came to lead the MCC Eagles in 1987. At Palmer's final year at MCC in 1996, he guided his team to the Division I Juco World Series at Grand Junction, Colorado, and in his final year at USM, his alma mater, he led his team to the College World Series in Omaha, Nebraska.

His name can be found in the halls of fame from USM to the Mississippi Sports to the Mississippi Association of Community Colleges Conference.

But former players, colleagues, and teammates help keep Palmer's memory: "From the first time I met him, he ate, drank, and breathed baseball."

"He was always concerned about the welfare of his players off the field and in the classroom as much as their performance between the lines! He certainly made everyone's life he touched better."

The Carlton "Corky" Palmer Scholarship Endowment has been started; recipients will be an MCC sophomore baseball player who has demonstrated outstanding leadership with a positive attitude, is a great teammate, and has high moral character.

COREY DICKERSON INDUCTED INTO MISSISSIPPI COMMUNITY COLLEGE SPORTS HALL OF FAME

Meridian Community College former Eagle baseball standout and Major League Baseball veteran Corey Dickerson, was inducted into the Mississippi Community College Sports Hall of Fame.

Each year, the Hall of Fame honors one representative from each of Mississippi's 15 community colleges. This year, MCC recognized Dickerson for his outstanding athletic achievements and lasting impact on the game of baseball.

A native of McComb, Dickerson began his athletic journey at Brookhaven Academy before joining the MCC baseball program from 2009 to 2010. During his two seasons as an Eagle, he quickly made a name for himself as one of the most dangerous hitters in junior college baseball. He posted a remarkable .459 batting average, hit 21 home runs, and drove in 71 RBIs, earning NJCAA All-Region honors and drawing significant interest from Major League scouts.



In 2010, Dickerson was selected in the 8th round of the MLB Draft by the Colorado Rockies. He made his MLB debut in 2013 and went on to enjoy an 11-year professional career, playing for seven teams: the Rockies, Tampa Bay Rays, Pittsburgh Pirates, Philadelphia Phillies, Miami Marlins, St. Louis Cardinals, and Washington Nationals.

During his MLB tenure, Dickerson collected more than 1,000 hits, 136 home runs, and maintained a .280 career batting average. He was named an MLB All-Star in 2017 with the Rays and earned a Gold Glove Award in 2018 as a left fielder with the Pirates–further cementing his status as one of the game's elite.

After retiring from professional baseball, Dickerson returned to Mississippi and transitioned into coaching. He now leads the baseball program at Jackson Academy in Jackson where he mentors and develops young athletes. He and his wife, Beth Anne, also an MCC alum, reside in Jackson with their children.

TAFADZWA CHIKOMBA SOARING BEYOND LIMITS

When Tafadzwa Chikomba arrived on Meridian Community College's campus from Harare, Zimbabwe, few could have predicted just how far – and how high – he would go.

Now, two years later, the student-athlete standout leaves as not just one of the greatest athletes in school history, but as one of the most decorated long jumpers in NJCAA history.

Chikomba's résumé speaks for itself: two national championships, undefeated in the 2025 season, and the holder of the 3rd and 4th best long jumps in NJCAA Indoor Track and Field history. He broke facility records at Troy University and Hutchinson Community College, was named National Athlete of the Week, and earned a reputation as the best NJCAA long jumper since 1995. His dominance extended beyond the junior college ranks, climbing to #4 on both the 2025 indoor and outdoor All-Collegiate lists and reaching #11 on the all-conditions outdoor list in NJCAA history. He has even qualified for the 2025 World Athletics Championships – an elite stage few athletes ever reach.

His journey to MCC began through a connection – another Zimbabwean athlete on the MCC roster who tipped off Head Coach Chip Gayden. From there, the recruitment process began, one that is as global as it is strategic.

"When we recruit international student-athletes, we study meet results from all over the world," Gayden explained. "Once we identify talent, we track them down on social media and start building relationships. Chikomba was one of those standout names – and when he arrived, he didn't disappoint."

Gayden noted that success breeds success, especially when it comes to recruiting international athletes. "Once you develop a reputation for nurturing elite talent, word spreads. Chikomba helped elevate our program's global profile," he said.

Beyond the medals and records, Chikomba is known for his discipline, humility, and relentless drive. While at MCC, he was a Dean's List scholar and a member of Phi Theta Kappa, the international academic honor society for community and junior college students. At graduation, Chikomba was awarded one of two Phil Hardin Foundation Scholarships that are funded through the MCC Foundation.

His story is one of talent meeting opportunity, and making the most of it.


As he continues his journey at Kansas State University






SPORTS ROUNDUP

BASEBALL

The Eagles wrapped up the 2024-25 baseball season with a 28-25 overall record, earning a





The Lady Eagles posted a 15-15 overall record and went 7-7 in conference play. They made it to the first round of the Region 23 Tournament and celebrated two athletes advancing to the next level: Annearrea Ducksworth (Rust College) and Halei Keyes (Rust College). Ducksworth also earned Honorable Mention All-MACCC honors. On the men's side, the Eagles ushered in a new era under head coach Clarence Weatherspoon. The team battled throughout the season, finishing 11-18 overall and 4-10 in MACCC play, and will look to build on that foundation

moving forward. Sophomore standouts Michael James and Chance Sutton will continue their careers at Mississippi Valley State.

Meridian's men's golf team capped off an

impressive season ranked 7th nationally in the NJCAA and Bushnell/Golfweek DII Coaches Poll. The Eagles finished as runners-up in both the MACCC Championship and the District Championship before placing 9th in the NJCAA DII National Tournament. Sophomore Bruce McClung was named a Second Team Ping All-American, while freshman Jace Duckworth earned honorable mention honors and was named to the 2025 All-Freshman Team – a distinction given to the top five freshmen in the country. Both McClung and Duckworth were also selected to the All-Region South Team.

SOCCER

The Lady Eagles ended their season with an 8-6-2 record and went 4-5-2 in conference play. Three student-athletes signed to play at the next level: Lauren Smith (Lamar University), Holly Gillies (University of West Alabama), and Kareli Mendoza (Belhaven University).

The Eagles finished 9-7-3 overall and 5-3-3 in MACCC play, advancing to the Region 23 Tournament for the first time since 2012. Under first-year head coach Diego Figueroa, the program saw significant progress, with five players signing to continue their careers: McKhi Castro (Harding University), Matty Longdon (Webber), Calvin Jackson (Tennessee Southern), Anderi Elias (Tennessee Southern), and Bubba Guerrero (Noble University).

The Lady Eagles softball team played their inaugural season at the brand-new Tommy McDonald Field at the Citizens National Bank Sports Complex. The team finished 21-34 overall and 6-22 in MACCC play. Freshman Hannah Buckley was named Honorable Mention All-MACCC for her efforts throughout the season.





SWIMMING & DIVING

The Swimming & Diving team capped off its season with strong performances at the NJCAA National Championships in Buffalo, New York. The women's team placed 11th overall with 61 points, while the men's team earned a historic 14th-place finish in their first-ever appearance at Nationals. Sophomore Megan Heggie earned All-American recognition in the 200 Breaststroke, and freshman Kyla Goldman was named an All-American in the 100 Backstroke. Both athletes earned podium finishes and helped solidify MCC's growing national presence. With multiple school and personal records broken throughout the season, the program continues to build momentum in only its second year of competition.

TENNIS

The Lady Eagles tennis team closed the season ranked 18th in the nation and placed 16th overall at the NJCAA National Tournament in Tyler, Texas. Their national berth followed a strong showing at the Region 23 Championship at Jones College, where they finished third. Sophomore Lilly Hollingsworth was named to the All-MACCC team for her standout play.

The men's team ended the year ranked 20th in the country and made a solid showing at the NJCAA National Tournament in Florence, South Carolina. Sophomore Simon Ojeda (SOSU signee) and freshman Daniel Espin both earned All-MACCC team honors.

TRACK & FIELD

In indoor competition, the men's track and field team finished 9th in the NJCAA National Meet in Lubbock, Texas, while the women's team placed 22nd. The momentum continued outdoors, with the men finishing 13th and the women 21st at the NJCAA Outdoor Nationals in Hutchinson, Kansas. The season was headlined by Tafadzwa Chikomba (Kansas State signee), who claimed national championships in the men's long jump at both the indoor and outdoor national meets. VOLLEYBALL

The Lady Eagles completed their inaugural volleyball season under Head Coach Alex Schimelpfening, competing in the MACCC with a roster made up entirely of freshmen. While the season brought its fair share of learning moments, the first-year program gained valuable experience on the court and laid the foundation for future success. MCC added Julia Espinoza to the coaching staff ahead of year two, as the team continues to grow and develop. Off the court, five Lady Eagles earned Academic All-MACCC honors, including three recognized as Distinguished Academic All-MACCC recipients.

E.L.C. CLASS CREATES APPTO SHARE MCC'S MESSAGE



The Eagles Leadership Convocation (E.L.C.) Class of 2025 answered the call to soar as they presented their capstone project: The Perch, a newly developed MCC mobile app designed to make it easier for students and staff to stay connected.

E.L.C. is an academic year-long professional development and leadership program comprising 10 MCC faculty and staff members. As a part of their final project, the E.L.C. members crafted a fully-developed group project focused on identifying a College need – enhancing communication - and presented it to the President's Cabinet.

Making the connection of the College's eagle mascot, The Perch offers a simple, streamlined way to access campus information, events, and resources all in one place, E.L.C. class members reported. With this project, the E.L.C. team demonstrated how leadership at Meridian Community College means finding real solutions that improve the everyday experience on campus.

This year's cohort included Darren Bane, director of workforce development; William Davidson, associate dean for institutional research; Casey Holladay, director of social media; Phyllis Holladay, Eagles Scholars program coordinator and mathematics instructor; Jaterra Hurst, women's basketball assistant coach; Matthew Milner, director of videography and sports information director; Jim Price, director of facilities management; Flora Sumrall, Business Office

Dr. Hill noted the app would not be a replacement for any type of communication tool but an additional one. "It's one more way to collectively put everything in an easy place for people to reach," she said.

MCC'S MARGARET TAYLOR BLALOCK STUDENT RESOURCE CENTER HELPS STUDENTS FACING HARDSHIPS

Katherine (not her real name) is a sophomore at Meridian Community College, juggling her world as a single mom and student.

She's making sacrifices to make a better life for herself and her daughter. "I've always taken pride in being self-sufficient. But in the past year, I have run into several hardships and unable to buy food; sometimes there's no money for gas or medicine, much less food," she said.

With the costs of basic living ever rising, Katherine often skips meals to make ends meet.

Food insecurity, the lack of reliable access to enough food, affects 47 million Americans each year, including 14 million children. Among college students the numbers are even more staggering – national studies show that up to 50 percent struggle with food insecurity, which can impact their ability to stay in school and succeed academically.

However, thanks to the Margaret Taylor Blalock Student Resource Center, MCC students like Katherine and others are getting a helping hand to meet their basic needs.

The center is located on the ground floor of the L.O. Todd/Billy C. Beal Student Success Center and was created through an endowment funded by Chip and Lisa Taylor of Oklahoma City, Oklahoma, through the MCC Foundation.

Taylor explained that his mom, Margaret Taylor Blalock, was a single parent who worked at MCC from 1968 to 1979. A dedicated counselor and compassionate mentor who touched the lives of countless students, Blalock saw helping others as her mission. "Mom was always there for her students, encouraging and helping them reach their educational goals, but also encouraging and counseling them in life," Taylor said. Three years ago, she passed away at the age of 95.

Now open, the Margaret Taylor Blalock Student Resource Center is a fresh new welcoming space featuring two large rooms, a sitting area, a storage area, and a private setting for one-on-one, discrete conversations. Wendy Cox, MCC support services coordinator, oversees the center.



With a year in the making, the new facility was specially renovated to address the needs of students.

Major purchases for the Margaret Taylor Blalock Student Resource

Center will be made annually based on the endowment's investment.

Students who visit fill out a slip of paper used internally for reporting purposes. "Once they check-in, they can get what they need," Cox said. Their essential needs are as varied as the students themselves. There are men and women's career and casual clothing, outfits for babies and children, laptops and textbooks that are available to be loaned, personal hygiene items, some cleaning supplies, and diapers and wipes.

The food, though, is a major draw. "Fruit goes quickly, and ready-to-eat meals do as well," Cox said.

"Students can come here between classes and get something to eat that's easy - they'll eat it on the go," she added.

Donations to the center are welcomed, Cox noted, and there have been donations from on and off-campus organizations. "Former nursing students have come back and have donated scrubs. 'I know they'll need them,' one donor told me," Cox said.

"Donor students have reached out to their communities - churches, clubs to give to the center," she said.

Katherine is grateful for the new center. "Because of the generosity of the people of this campus, I was able to piece it together and get through. It's a blessing and a huge testament to our community and MCC."
